POLICY COUNCIL MEETING MINUTES September 22, 2025 CAPK Administrative Office 1300 18th Street, Bakersfield, CA 93301

1. Call to Order

The meeting was called to order at 5:31 p.m. by Chairperson, Ruby Cruz.

a. Roll call was taken, and a quorum was established.

3. Committee Verbal Reports

a. Budget & Finance Committee - Gabriela Rangel

The Budget & Finance Committee met on September 16, 2025 and reviewed all financial reports for the period from March 1, 2025 through July 31, 2025. Additional reports reviewed included Non-Federal Share (in-kind), Parent Activities as well as Parent Local Travel & Childcare Reimbursement. It was noted that the program is on track for the current fiscal year and will also surpass its non-federal share requirement. The next Budget & Finance Committee meeting will take place on Tuesday, September 16, 2025 at 5:30 p.m.

b. Bylaws Committee - Dominique Bassi

The Bylaws Committee met on September 17, 2025 and continued its review of the balance of the bylaws document. Over the course of the committee meetings, recommendations for revisions were made for various articles of the document. The committee will have its final meeting on October 7, 2025 at which time they will review the draft version of the bylaws which will contain all recommended committee revisions.

c. Planning Committee - Christopher Cuzul

The Planning Committee met on September 9, 2025 and reviewed the Division Program Activity Report for the month of August 2025. Early Head Start reported 97% enrollment and Head Start reported 78% enrollment during this reporting period. The Central Kitchen prepared a total of 40,296 meals and there were 46,918 meals delivered during the month of July. A current enrollment update was also provided to the committee. The next Planning Meeting will take place at 5:30 p.m. on October 14, 2025.

d. School Readiness Committee - Kaylonie Howard

It was shared that full year centers have completed the Desired Results Developmental Profile assessments for children with part-year centers completing their assessments at a later date. The current school readiness domain is social and emotional development with the goal that children will strengthen their skills and social behavior, emotional regulation, and emotional wellbeing. School readiness means that children possess the knowledge and skills necessary not only for success in school but for later learning as well which helps to build a solid foundation for long term life skills across all areas.

4. New Business

a. 2025 Enrollment Update – Robert Espinosa, Program Design and Management Administrator – Information Item

In providing an update on the enrollment status for the program, Robert stated that the goal is to meet the required enrollment criteria by the end of September. This is essential for a number of reasons, most

notably to prevent any fallout from occurring due to the program's current enrollment plan of action. Robert reviewed reports, sharing data and providing specific figures as it relates to enrollment for both Head Start and Early Head Start. It was noted that with 8-days left to reach reportable full enrollment, Head Start was at 83% (not including non-accepted children). Nine hundred eight children are needed to reach the minimum mark of 97%. Robert also shared that one of the biggest challenges the program has faced is transitional kindergarten (TK), as TK is now accepting 3-year-old as well as 4-year-old children. It was clarified that though 97% is a reportable number for full enrollment, we always want to strive to achieve 100% full enrollment. Discussion continued on various components of enrollment such as overincome families, recruitment opportunities and events, family childcare contracts, staffing as well as potential partnerships and memorandums of understanding with community agencies and more. Upon conclusion of all discussion, Robert thanked everyone for all the work that is being done to support reaching full enrollment, noting that it is a team effort.

5. Presentations

a. Family Engagement – Angel Arevalo, Family Engagement Supervisor Angel began the presentation by stating that family engagement is a collaboration between teachers, school staff, parents, and the community. He added that everyone attending the meeting is family engagement; all working together to support children's learning and development. In continuing the presentation Angel engaged Council members by asking them to think back to when they were children, and what they wanted to be when they grew up. Several members shared their responses which ranged from a veterinarian to a classical musician to a pilot, a lawyer and more! Angel shared that every school meeting, school event, parent teacher conference, participation in activities of their interest ensures that children succeed, and that they feel loved and supported. Pictures of their children as provided by parent members were shown followed by the parent member sharing a bit about their child. In continuing with the balance of the presentation, information was shared about a variety of ways in which Head Start supports parents and children succeed. Information shared included but was not limited to ReadyRosie, the family partnership agreement, family referrals, resources and more. Angel also spoke about the 3rd Annual Fatherhood Conference which will take place in January 2026 and shared video footage from the 2nd Annual Fatherhood Conference. In closing, Angel shared that as we (parents) are raising children, time goes by very quickly and the most important thing to remember is spending time with them is so important; it's not about giving them material things. Gifts and other things will come and go, however, when parents spend time with their children that is what they will remember. The times you showed up for them, no matter how big or small.

A motion was made by Michelle Jara-Rangel and seconded by Gabriela Rangel to approve consent agenda items (a) through (ff). Motion carried unanimously.

7. Standing Reports

a. Program Governance – Lisa Gonzales, Program Governance Coordinator

Lisa thanked members for pivoting and meeting virtually due to the power outage earlier in the day at the Administrative Office.

Information was shared about the Head Start Alumni survey from the CAPK Community Development Team. She encouraged members to complete the survey, to share their Head Start experience. Data from the survey will support the events taking place in October for Head Start Awareness Month, which also coincides this year with Head Start's 60th Birthday. Additionally, similar information was shared with members about the Head Start California campaigns request to share Head Start stories with them as well. Lisa shared a bit about her Head Start story with the Council.

Additional information shared included the Feed the Need Event taking place at the Kern County Fair to benefit the CAPK Food Bank, the upcoming Recruitment and Selection Plan Meeting as well as the October Dr. Kirk Parent Training. Lisa stated that flyers for these events and more can be found in the Policy Council packet.

Lisa reminded members to mark their calendar for the final meeting of the term. This meeting will also serve as a member recognition event. She stated that a flyer would be sent out soon, with more information to follow. Lisa also shared that the hope for this year's event is that those newly elected members for the 2025-2026 term are able to attend this event as well. This will provide them with the opportunity to see a Policy Council meeting prior to the start of their term, as well as give them the opportunity to connect with current members who can share their experiences with them. Incoming members will also have the opportunity to meet staff.

In closing Lisa stated that Regional Parent Committee meetings will be held on various dates next month to elect members to serve on the 2025-2026 Policy Council. She reiterated that should anyone want to continue for another term on the Council, they must be a Regional Parent Committee (RPC) Representative. The selection process for RPC takes place at the monthly parent meeting. Clarification was requested as to in what manner the meetings will be held. It was shared that all meetings, RPC, Policy Council and Policy Council

committee meetings will be held in person at the Administrative Office. It was further suggested that this information be shared with staff so parents can make a more informed decision about their participation.

- b. Community Representative Ian Anderson, Kern Adult Literacy Council
 - lan shared that ESL classes have begun at the Family Resource Center in Lamont and will be a 12-week course. Ian stated that there is still space available and encouraged members to share this information with anyone they may know that might benefit. He also added, if they cannot attend at this time, they can attend the next course as it is an ongoing service. Ian shared that the Kern Adult Literacy Council (KALC) has just begun to provide tutoring services at the Police Activities League (PAL). Tutors will be available during afterschool hours. He also announced that they are in the process of starting some adult focused classes such as GED, ESL, career soft skills, etc. Ian shared that they continue to recruit for the U.S. Citizenship course which is a test preparation course. There are a few students in the course, and they would like to see more enrollment. Classes are on Tuesday mornings from 10:00 a.m. until 12:00 p.m. The Literacy Council received a book donation from the Shafter Youth Center which in turn will be used to support the free Little Libraries located throughout the community.
- c. Community Representative Paula De La Riva, First 5 Kern
 No report was provided as Paula was unable to attend the meeting.
- d. **Board of Directors Michelle Jara-Rangel, CAPK Board of Directors Representative**Michelle stated the Board of Directors met on August 20, 2025 and began with a moment of silence observed in memory of Board member Yolanda Ochoa. There was also a special presentation in recognition of outgoing member, and Policy Representative to the Board of Directors, Fatima Echeverria.

There were several action items as well as informational items presented to the Board under new business. Most noteworthy were the election results for the Eastern Kern Low-Income CAPK Board of Directors position. Election outcomes revealed that Yolanda Ochoa won the election by a large margin. However, due to the unexpected passing of Board Member Ochoa, the Board was tasked with how to proceed in filling this vacancy. A decision is not expected until the September meeting. Additional action items presented were the 2025-2029 Strategic Plan, Conclusion and Closure of the Cal Fresh Healthy Living Program, Youth and Community Access Grant Program, the 2026-2027 Head Start Program Goals and Objectives and the Financial Reports for June 2025. Each action item was presented independently and in detail to the Board followed by an opportunity for discussion. Upon conclusion of each presentation, all action items were approved. The informational items shared were the Closeout Report for the 2021-2025 Strategic Plan as well as the recognition of CAPK as a National Community Action 2025 Pathways to Excellence Silver Tier Agency.

The reports for the CalVet's Assistance Foundation, and the Policy Council were presented and approved. Chief Executive Officer Jeremy Tobias provided an update on the federal and state budgets. It was stated that all of CAPKs core program were funded, including a small Cost of Living Adjustment for Head Start.

The Board convened for closed session to conference with legal counsel regarding potential litigation. The Board of Directors will meet next on September 24, 2025.

e. Head Start/State Child Development – Yolanda Gonzales, Head Start/State Child Development Director Yolanda shared that as a result of conversations with Kern Health Systems, the program recently held its first mobile health clinic at the Angela Martinez site, and it went very well. She stated that the program will continue to collaborate with Kern Health Systems to have the mobile health units at some of the larger centers. This service is beneficial, especially at the beginning of the year when children need to obtain additional immunizations, physicals or simply for parents to gain resources that benefit children's health and well-being.

Recruitment of children as previously shared is ongoing, not only to help support full enrollment but to support having a waitlist. This is not only the expectation but is necessary to have in place so that when a child drops from the program, we have a list of children that we can pull from to fill that open spot to ensure we are always fully enrolled.

Yolanda mentioned that parent teacher conferences are coming up and thanked parents for their support in this area. She added, as presented earlier, this is part of the reason for family engagement. Parents can engage in developing their child's goals as well as with the development of their family partnership agreements.

Gratitude was expressed to the Council for all the work they have done and continue to do. In addressing those members who are leaving the Council, Yolanda shared her appreciation for joining staff on this journey over the past year. She added that staff are ready to welcome those new members who will serve on the Council for the 2025-2026 term. Yolanda stated that the Policy Council is a particularly important part of Head Start, and she looks forward to seeing members next month. Members were thanked again for their support of Policy Council as well as for the support they have shown for our Head Start centers.

In closing, Yolanda shared that in-kind totals for the program have been above and beyond, and this is a direct result of parent participation. She thanked parents for all the time they spend with their children, for making that investment which will last a lifetime.

Members had an opportunity to share a comment if they would like.

Gabriela Rangel stated that she wanted to speak on the ReadyRosie workshops and the other family engagement activities that are provided to families. She shared that she felt those things were one of the best parts of the program. It is through all of those activities that you really get to discover your children in other ways. Gabriela shared that earlier in the year when the center had a Teatime for Mother's Day, it was incredibly special and meant so much to her to have that experience.

Michelle Jara-Rangel shared that she was really looking forward to meeting in person because she hasn't been able to do so for a while. She thanked Lisa for all the time and effort she puts forth in finding all the community flyers and resources. Michelle stated they are beneficial, and she shares them on her Facebook page as well as with others in the community. She thanked Lisa again for all her hard work.

10. Next Scheduled Meeting

The next Policy Council meeting, which will be the final meeting of the term will held on October 28, 2025 at 5:30 p.m. in the Board Room.

The Head Start Budget to Actual report for the period of March 1, 2025 through July 31, 2025 was presented to the committee for review and discussion. The report indicated that the base funds for the Head Start grant were at 41% expended, with training and technical assistance at 39% expended during this period.

Additionally reviewed was the Early Head Start budget report for the same reporting period. This report noted 40% of funds were expended in base funds and 26% expended in training and technical assistance. Louis stated this period of time reflects the fifth month of a twelve month budget cycle.

Details of the Non-Federal Share Report were provided as well. The program's non-federal share during this same reporting period, March 1, 2025 through July 31, 2025 was 66%. Louis shared that if the program continues on this trend, it will exceed its goal/requirement.

The parent local travel and childcare report was provided for the period ending July 31, 2025. It was noted there was \$443 in Head Start expenditures and Early Head Start had expenditures of \$249. There wasn't any change from the previous month because the Policy Council is dark and doesn't meet in July therefore there wouldn't be any parent travel or childcare reimbursement expenses.

In reviewing the parent activities report it was shared there has been \$803 expended from the Head Start grant and \$452 expended from the Early Head Start grant for the period ending July 31, 2025. Lisa shared that this number will be increasing in the coming months as all meeting including committee meetings will meet in person, with snacks provided, as well as mileage and childcare reimbursement available as well. She added that with a new Council coming on board in November there will also be new Policy Council shirts, and the upcoming end of term event which will all be reflected as expenditures. It was asked if the committee meetings will also be held at the Administrative Office, to which it was confirmed however noted that because of the smaller size of committees these meetings may be held in smaller conference rooms.

Discussion ensued from members stating the hope that there would be more parent participation in the upcoming term to have greater conversation on topics. It was also noted that several members had shared that they felt staff needed to have a better understanding of Regional Parent Committee meetings and what they were so that they could share that information with parents a little more effectively. Lisa shared that she took members' input and will be hosting a drop in training to share more information with staff about this topic.

Lisa reminded members of the upcoming Policy Council meeting taking place on Monday, September 22, 2025 in order to support the Feed the Need event at the Kern County Fair on Tuesday, September 23, 2023. She also reminded those members who still have a child enrolled in the program that if they would like to potentially serve another term on the Policy Council that they must attend their Parent Meeting and volunteer to serve as a Regional Parent Committee Representative for their center. Gabriella shared that she encouraged another parent to participate in this role because she noticed that they were very involved. Lisa shared the RPC meeting dates for those members at the meeting.

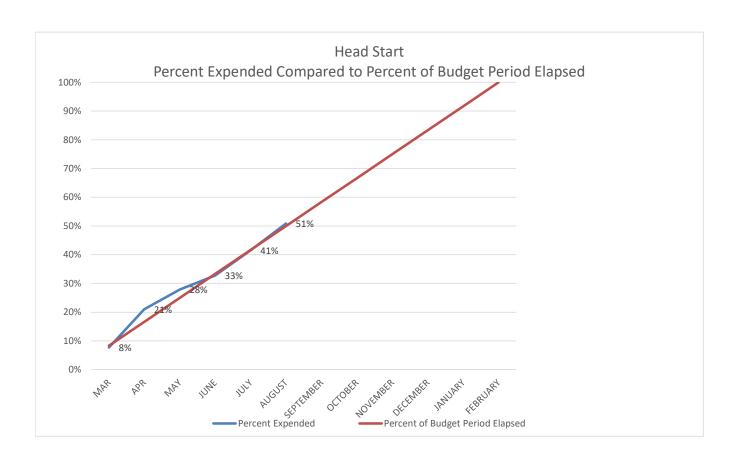

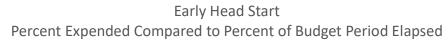

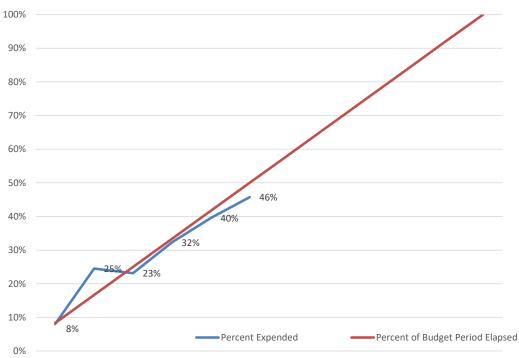

Explanation (Over/Under Goal Progress)

The month of September 2025 was a busy month. We met our funded enrollment for Early Head Start at 100% and for Head Start at 98%. We have reviewed 325 applications this month and will continue the process for next month to maintain and/or improve our enrollment numbers for October.

Progress Towards Goal

Objective B: The program will develop a dual-language framework and will strengthen the ability of staff to work with dual-language learners.

Goal IV: School Readiness: Increase families and staff capacity to support children's school readiness and to implement a quality program by enhanching an inclusive environment to strengthen teacher and child interactions.

In Progress: Site Supervisors attended the preschool dual language training on September 30, 2025, to build staff knowledge in supporting dual language learners. The next training will take place at the start of 2026 and will be provided to center-based and education staff to advance towards the goal of reaching 15% of staff training for dual language.

Program	

- 1. Tuesday, September 9, 2025 Staff Training with Dr. Kirk at the Sterling Center. Dr. Kirk provided strategies on how to deal with specific behaviors such as ignoring negative behaviors and focusing on positive behaviors. He emphasized the importance of consistency and repetition, stating it takes approximately 3 weeks for a behavior change.
- 2.Monday, September 15, 2025 The Health Team conducted CPR training for center staff.
- 3.Tuesday, September 23, 2025 The Enrollment and Attendance team participated in the Feed the Need Event at the Kern County Fair. The team collected canned goods and handed out flyers for Head Start Services.
- 4.During the month of September, The Family Engagement team provided four Ready Rosie Family Workshops. The workshops consisted of Fostering Listening Skills in Your Child, Families as Partners, and Families as Leaders. Parents learned the different meanings of what it means to be a leader, and parents were able to identify what type of leader they are and share it with the group.
- 5.The current school readiness domain is Physical Development Health, and our Education team is accomplishing this by teaching Early Head Start children about bags, how to use them and what type of bags exist. The Education team is also teaching our Head Start children about exercise. 6.Our part-year Desired Results Developmental Profile (DRDP) was finalized this week and soon teachers will be scheduling parent conferences. Some of these conferences will be completed in the family's homes.



Backpack Connection Series

About this Series

The Backpack Connection Series was created by TACSEI to provide a way for teachers and parents/caregivers to work together to help young children develop social emotional skills and reduce challenging behavior. Teachers may choose to send a handout home in each child's backpack when a new strategy or skill is introduced to the class. Each Backpack Connection handout provides information that helps parents stay informed about what their child is learning at school and specific ideas on how to use the strategy or skill at home.

The Pyramid Model



The Pyramid Model is a framework that provides programs with guidance on how to promote social emotional compe-

tence in all children and design effective interventions that support young children who might have persistent challenging behavior. It also provides practices to ensure that children with social emotional delays receive intentional teaching. Programs that implement the Pyramid Model are eager to work together with families to meet every child's individualized learning and support needs. How to Plan Activities to Reduce Challenging Behavior

Unfortunately, there is no "Guidebook for Parents" that tells you exactly how to raise children who behave perfectly at all times. Each child and family is unique, which means that there is no one solution or strategy that is going to work for everyone, every time. However, while it isn't magic, simple planning ahead can work wonders to help improve your child's behavior. You can plan activities to teach your child important skills such as sharing, taking turns or handling disappointment. You can also plan ahead to prepare your child for new events in her life such as changes in her schedule, a road trip, a new baby or a visit from grandparents.

For example, Abby is three years old and is usually happy at preschool where she loves to draw and play with the doll house. However, at home when Abby plays one-on-one with another child, she often ends up throwing toys, screaming "Mine!" or crying. What can Abby's mom do? Instead of always "managing" these outbursts, she can intentionally plan activities to teach Abby the skills of sharing and taking turns. She can also plan activities that give Abby an opportunity to practice these new skills.

Try This at Home

- Tell your child exactly what to do. Telling your child to "share" or "be nice" does not actually tell her what she should be doing. For example, if Abby throws her toys, her mom can say, "Abby, toys stay on the floor or on your lap." If Abby hits her friend, her mom can say, "Hands down. Hands are for playing, eating, and hugging. Use your words. You can say, 'I am angry. Help please'."
- Use a Visual Schedule. A visual schedule will help her to understand what is expected. To learn more about visual schedules, read the How to Use Visual Schedules to Help Your Child Understand Expectations handout in the Backpack Connection Series.
- Practice, practice, practice. Intentionally create situations where she can practice the desired behavior. For example, Abby's mom can help Abby learn to take turns while playing with her sister or an older friend. She can ask Abby's sister to "help teach Abby to take turns" while playing with one doll. Abby's mom provides the toy and reminds the girls to take turns when playing. The girls can practice the skill of sharing during their time together.
- Catch your child being good! When your child is using the desired behavior, you can encourage her by responding with enthusiasm. For example, "Wow, I saw you share the sand toys at the park with those two girls. What a great friend you are!"
- Prepare your child before an event. For example, Abby's mom can say, "Abby, your friend Ella is coming over to play today. When friends come over,

we share our toys. I know how special doggy is to you. We could put doggy in a safe place and you do not have to share her."



Hope for the best but plan

for the worst! If you know that your child might have problems when playing with other children, stay nearby so that you can intervene if needed. You might also provide two sets of an identical toy (e.g., two bubbles or two balls) and then offer a change in location to play to diffuse difficult situations.

E Practice at School

School offers many opportunities for children to practice social skills and learn emotional vocabulary. Teachers can set up art or quiet activities where children have the opportunity to practice sharing, learning to wait and taking turns. As children interact with each other, teachers provide positive language. For example, "Abby, I see that you are pointing to the red marker. You can tap Jacob on the shoulder and say, 'Can I have a turn?'" After the interaction, the teacher provides the children with encouragement. For example, "Way to go! Class, Abby and Jacob are working together. They are sharing and taking turns!" Teachers can also use daily schedule changes to teach the skill of handling disappointment. For example, "Oh no, Miss Marcie is not here today. We won't be able to go to music. I am really disappointed. What should we do?" At this point, the children can learn to problem-solve and come up with a positive solution.



The Bottom Line

Much of the frustration that parents experience can be avoided by planning ahead and teaching children a desired behavior before a difficult situation occurs. When you are unprepared for your child's challenging behavior, such as whining or temper tantrums, you might respond with anger or in other ways that make the situation worse. Remember that you are in control of the daily schedule and routine. If your child is having problems with activities such as play with others, drop-off at school, or bedtime, you can plan activities that will give her the opportunity to learn the social skills she needs. Planning ahead can reduce challenging behavior such as meltdowns, whining and temper tantrums and increase desired behavior such as flexibility, using words and patience. Planning activities that teach skills such as sharing and taking turns will provide her with the tools she needs to increase selfesteem and be successful in school and life.



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Serie de Conexión Mochila

Sobre esta serie

La Serie de Conexión Mochila fue instaurada por TACSEI (por sus siglas en inglés) para brindarle a los maestros y padres/proveedores una vía para trabajar en conjunto para ayudar a los niños a desarrollar sus aptitudes socioemocionales y reducir las conductas desafiantes. Los maestros podrían elegir enviar un volante a casa dentro de la mochila de cada niño cada vez que sea introducida una nueva estrategia o aptitud dentro de la clase. Cada volante de la Conexión de Mochila proporciona información que ayudará a los padres a estar informados sobre lo que su niño está aprendiendo en la escuela y las ideas específicas sobre cómo utilizar las estrategias o aptitudes en casa.

El Modelo de la Pirámide



El Modelo de la Pirámide es un marco que proporciona a los programas orientación en como promover la capacidad socioemocional en todos

los niños y diseñar intervenciones efectivas que apoyen a los niños que puedan contar con conductas desafiantes persistentes. También proporciona prácticas para asegurarse de que los niños con retrasos socioemocionales reciban educación intencional. Los programas que implementan el Modelo de la Pirámide están entusiasmados de trabajar en sociedad con las familias para satisfacer las necesidades individuales de aprendizaje y apoyo que cada niño necesita. Cómo planear actividades para reducir la conducta desafiante

Desafortunadamente, no existe una "Guía para los Padres" que le diga exactamente como crear niños que se comporten siempre de manera perfecta. Cada niño y cada familia son únicos, lo que significa que no hay una solución o estrategia que funcione con todos, siempre. No obstante, si bien no es magia, la simple planeación puede hacer maravillas para mejorar la conducta de su niño. Usted puede planear actividades para enseñarle a su niño aptitudes importantes tales como el compartir, tomar turnos o enfrentar la decepción. También puede planear a futuro para preparar a su niño para eventos nuevos en su vida tales como los cambios en su horario, un viaje por carretera, un nuevo bebé o una visita de sus abuelos.

Por ejemplo, Abby tiene tres años y por lo general está contenta en la guardería donde le encanta dibujar y jugar con la casa de muñecas. Sin embargo, en casa cuando Abby juega con otro niño, a menudo acaba lanzando los juguetes, gritando "¡Mío!" o llorando. ¿Qué puede hacer la mamá de Abby? En vez de siempre estar "controlando" estos arrebatos, ella puede planear actividades que le enseñen a Abby las habilidades de compartir y tomar turnos. Ella también puede planear actividades que le den la oportunidad a Abby de practicar estas nuevas aptitudes.

庐 Pruebe esto en casa

- Dígale a su niño exactamente qué hacer. El decirle "comparte" o "se bueno" en realidad no le dice que debería estar haciendo. Por ejemplo, si Abby lanza un juguete, su mamá le puede decir, "Abby los juguetes se quedan en el piso o en tu regazo." Si Abby le pega a su amigo/a, su mamá puede decir, "Las manos abajo. Las manos son para jugar, comer y abrazar. Utiliza las palabras. Puedes decir. 'Estoy enojada. Ayuda por favor'."
- Utilice una agenda visual. Una agenda visual le ayudará a comprender lo que se espera de ella. Para aprender más sobre las agendas visuales, lea el folleto de "Cómo utilizar una agenda visual para ayudar a su niño a comprender las expectativas" dentro de la Serie Conexión Mochila.
- Practique, practique, practique. Intencionalmente fabrique situaciones donde él pueda practicar la conducta deseada. Por ejemplo, la mamá de Abby le puede ayudar a Abby aprender a tomar turnos mientras juega con su hermana o amigo mayor. Ella le puede pedir a la hermana de Abby que le "ayude a enseñar a Abby a tomar turnos" mientras juegan con una sola muñeca. La mamá de Abby proporciona el juguete y les recuerda a las niñas que deben tomar turnos mientras juegan. Las niñas pueden practicar la habilidad de compartir durante el tiempo que estén juntas.
- ¡Note a su niño siendo bueno! Cuando su niño esté desempeñando la conducta deseada, anímelo respondiendo con entusiasmo. Por ejemplo, "Guau, te vi compartir los juguetes para la arena en el parque con esos dos niños. ¡Qué buen amigo eres!"
- Prepare a su niño antes de un evento. Por ejemplo, la mamá de Abby puede decir, "Abby, tu amiga va

a venir a jugar hoy. Cuando vienen tus amigos a jugar, compartimos los juguetes. Sé lo especial que es el perrito para ti. Podemos colocar el perrito en un lugar seguro y no lo tienes que compartir."



iEspere lo mejor pero planee para lo peor!
Si sabe que su niño va a tener problemas mientras juega con otros niños, quédese cerca de manera que pueda intervenir de ser necesario. También puede proporcionar dos juegos idénticos de juguetes (p. ej. dos burbujas o dos pelotas) y después ofrecer un cambio de lugar donde jugar para neutralizar situaciones difíciles.

ᡦ Practique en la escuela

La escuela ofrece muchas oportunidades para que los niños practiquen las aptitudes sociales y aprendan el vocabulario emocional. Las maestras pueden organizar actividades de arte o silenciosas donde los niños tienen la oportunidad de practicar el compartir, aprendiendo a esperar y tomar turnos. A medida que los niños interactúan uno con otro, las maestras ofrecen lenguaje positivo. Por ejemplo, "Abby, veo que estás señalando el marcador rojo. Puedes tocar a Jacobo en el hombro y decirle, '¿Puedo usarlo?" Después de la interacción, la maestra les brinda un estímulo. Por ejemplo, "¡Bien hecho! Niños, Abby y Jacobo están trabajando juntos. ¡Están compartiendo y tomando turnos!" Las maestras también pueden utilizar el cambio de horario diario para enseñar la aptitud de cómo manejar la decepción. Por ejemplo, "O no, la señorita Marcie no está aquí el día de hoy. No podremos tomar la clase de música hoy. Estoy realmente decepcionada. ¿Qué podemos hacer?"En este momento, los niños aprenden a resolver problemas y presentan una solución positiva.



La conclusión

Mucha de la frustración que los padres experimentan puede ser evitada si se planea para el futuro y si se les enseña a los niños una conducta deseada antes de que se presente una situación difícil. Cuando no está preparado para la conducta desafiante, tales como los lloriqueos o los berrinches, usted puede responder con enojo o de otras maneras que pueden empeorar la situación. Recuerde que usted está en control de la agenda y rutina diaria. Si su niño está teniendo dificultades con las actividades tales como jugar con los demás, ir a la escuela o a la hora de dormir, usted puede planear actividades que le darán la oportunidad a él de aprender las aptitudes sociales que él necesita. El planear para el futuro puede reducir las conductas desafiantes tales como las rabietas, lloriqueos y berrinches y aumenta las conductas deseadas tales como la flexibilidad, utilización de palabras y paciencia. Planear actividades que le enseñan aptitudes tales como compartir y tomar turnos le proporcionarán las herramientas que él necesita para incrementar su auto estima y ser exitoso en la escuela y en la vida.

The Kern County District Attorney's Office has a Victim Services Unit that is dedicated to ensuring the rights of crime victims are enforced and that victims have a meaningful voice throughout the criminal justice process.

The unit has advocates who are trained to assist victims and their families cope with the traumatic effects of crime. As a member of the prosecution team, advocates can provide information on criminal cases after victims have reported to law enforcement and support for those who need to report a crime. Collaboration with other community agencies ensure that additional needs and services are available.

Advocates are also qualified to assist victims of violent crime apply for the California Victim Compensation Program which may be able to assist with the reimbursement of out-of-pocket expenses related to the crime, excluding property loss.

Providing Dental Services to Children Ages Five & Younger



The referral process is easy! Children get their decay treated by a local pediatric dentist, free of charge.

HOW DOES THE NURSE REFERRAL DENTAL TREATMENT SYSTEM WORK?

When a school nurse or health aid identifies a child who has visible decay, the Nurse Referral Dental Treatment System can be a link for free dental treatment. The process is simple. If decay is visually identified, the school nurse completes the brief referral form, faxes it to the KCCDHN office, and staff facilitates an appointment with a Kern County pediatric dentist.

DO I NEED TO COMPLETE PAPERWORK BEFORE THE APPOINTMENT?

All necessary consent and medical forms will be completed by phone by the KCCDHN program staff. At the first dental

appointment, medical forms will be reviewed and signed by the parent. Translation services, if needed, are also provided by the dental office. Upon completion of the child's dental caries treatment, he/she will also receive a cleaning and fluoride treatment. If the child has her/his permanent molars, sealants will be applied to prevent decay. Prior to the child

beginning the treatment process, parents will receive oral health education materials that will support maintaining good oral hygiene for their child. Information will include the importance of caring for baby teeth, proper brushing skills, and the effect fluoride has on preventing and strengthening their child's teeth.

The Nurse Referral Dental Treatment System does not include the cost of six-month visit; however, the KCCDHN program staff is available to link the family to a dentist.

- The Nurse Referral Dental Treatment System is available to children ages 0–5 who have visible decay or are experiencing pain.
- Referrals can be submitted throughout the calendar year.
- Referral forms are brief and easy to complete.
- KCCDHN staff are bilingual and available to provide information to nurses, health aides and parents.

Approach/Philosophy/Priorities:

Community Action Partnership of Kern's Head Start/State Child Development is dedicated to building staff's skills, knowledge, experience, and professional competencies necessary to provide high quality, comprehensive, and linguistically appropriate family centered services for children and families assisting them on their road to success and school readiness. The program's priority is to provide training and technical assistance, so program services and systems are in compliance with Head Start Program and Early Head Start Performance Standards, the Head Start Act, State and Federal Regulations. The program offers Staff, Parents and our Governing Body opportunities and support for ongoing learning and career/professional development. Subject: 2026-27 HS/EHS Refunding Application – **Action Item**

As we approach the end of the 2026-2027 fiscal year, the Head Start and State Child Development division is requesting approval to submit our 2026-27 HS/EHS Refunding Application to the Office of Head Start. Staff are preparing the Head Start annual refunding application due December 1st. This annual refunding application will be the third year of the five-year grant cycle supporting funding from March 1, 2026, to February 28, 2027. Included with the annual application is the detailed budget.

Modifications were made in major categories based on actual expenses, planned programmatic changes and potential changes to the indirect cost methodology for the agency. Additional revenue is identified from fully earning state contracts through the California Department of Education (CDE) and California Department of Social Services (CDSS) which will balance the projected costs of the revised expenditures.

Program staff have also included the Head Start/Early Head Start budget detail documents demonstrating the newly adopted 12% indirect rate following CAPK's Board of Directors decision to approval. If a decision is made to change the CAPK indirect rate after the submission of the HS/EHS Refunding application has been submitted, program staff can modify the application as directed by the board through either written notification to the Office of Head Start prior to a March 1, 2026 notice of award, or through a budget revision process after a March 1, 2026 notice of award.

This item supports CAPK's goal in promoting educational opportunities that enrich the lives of children and their families.

Recommendation

Staff recommends Policy Council approve with the approval letter the submission of the 2026-2027 HS/EHS Refunding Application (09CH012489).

ARTICLE I NAME

The name of this organization will be Community Action Partnership of Kern Head Start/State Child Development Policy Council, hereafter known as the "Policy Council."

ARTICLE II PURPOSE AND FUNCTIONS

SECTION 1. Purpose

<u>1301.1</u> An agency must establish and maintain a formal structure for program governance that includes a governing body and a Policy Council at the agency level. Policy Councils are responsible for the direction of the agency's Head Start and Early Head Start programs.

1. General Procedures

- **a.** 1301.3 (a) Each agency must establish and maintain a Policy Council responsible for the direction of the Head Start program.
- **b.** 1301.3 (b) A program must establish a Policy Council in accordance with section 642 (c)(2)(B) of the Head Start Act. Parents of children currently enrolled in each program option must be proportionately represented on the Policy Council.
- **c.** 1301.6 Impasse Procedures. (a) Each agency's governing body and Policy Council jointly must establish written procedures for resolving internal disputes between the governing body board and Policy Council in a timely manner that include impasse procedures.

2. Human Resource Management – Must approve or disapprove:

a. 642(2)(D)(vi) The Policy Council shall approve pProgram personnel policies and decisions regarding the employment of program staff, consistent with paragraph (1)(E)(iv)(IX), including standards of conduct for program staff, contractors, and volunteers and criteria for the employment and dismissal of program staff.

ARTICLE III MEMBERSHIP

SECTION 1. Membership

1. Composition

- a. The Policy Council will be comprised composed of: Community RepresentativesMembers of the community served by the Head Start agency which may include — may be former Head Start parents or from the community. At least fifty-one percent (51%) of the Policy Council will be parents of children currently enrolled in the Head Start/State Child Development program.
- **b.** A parent is defined as "a Head Start/Early Head Start child's mother or father, other family member who is the primary caregiver, foster parent, guardian or the person with whom the child has been placed for purposes of adoption pending a final adoption decree."

SECTION 2. Types of Membership

A parent must have a child currently enrolled in the Head Start/State Child Development program to be a member of the Regional Parent Committee (RPC). The RPC was developed to ensure the Policy Council is proportionately represented in each program option. The Policy Council membership shall consist of the following:

- **a.** Regional Parent Committee meetings will be held as needed to elect members to the Policy Council.
- **b.** If a member's child changes to another program option or region during the program year, they will remain on Policy Council until the position is filled. Once the position is filled, the current member will be terminated and encouraged to seek election with their new parent committee.
- c. In the event the a member's child ages out of the Head Start/Early Head Start Kern, Early Head Start Child Care Partnerships, or the Early Head Start San Joaquin program, the member will continue their membership until the end of to serve on the Policy Council until the end of the term.

1. Community Representatives

Community Representatives may be selected from the local community: businesses, public or private communitysector, civic, and professional organizations as well as others who are familiar with resources and services for low-income children and families, including for example, parents of formerly enrolled children. 642(2)(B)(ii)(II)

- a. Two (2) Community Agency Representatives. Community representatives must follow the application process and obtain Policy Council approval before they can be seated. Community representatives will have the responsibility of providing a monthly verbal report appointed by a community agency. Responsibilities will include a monthly verbal report on agency current events and that support to the Head Start program and the families it serves.
- b. One (1) Community Representative-Past Parent Community Representative. The pPast pParent representative must be elected to the Policy Council and must may not have a child or children currently enrolled in the Head Start program./State Child Development Program. The Past Parent Representative must be in a member of an elementary school Parent Teacher Association, or Parent Teacher Organization or similar affiliation. Responsibilities The responsibility will include providing a monthly verbal report, sharing information that supports section readiness for Head Start parents.
- c. Community Representatives may serve on the Policy Council for a total of five (5) years (collective total as a parent Policy Council Member and/or Community Representative Policy Council Member.) Representatives must stand for election annually.

Community Representatives must apply and be approved by the Policy Council before they can be seated. Community Representatives will provide a monthly verbal report on current events that support the Head Start Program.

If any Community Representative becomes a Head Start parent during a Policy Council <u>yearterm</u>, their <u>current</u> membership will be terminated: When a vacancy occurs, they may seek election with their new parent committee.

2. Board of Director's Representative:

One (1) member of the Board of Directors of the Community Action Partnership of Kern will be appointed to serve on the Policy Council each year. The appointed Board Member may

serve as the Board of Director's Representative for up to five (5) years (collective total as a parent Policy Council Member, Community Representative Policy Council Member and/or Board of Director's Community Representative.)

SECTION 3. Seating and Training of Members

Parent representatives and community representatives are seated as official voting Policy Council members at the first Policy Council meeting following completion of their Policy Council orientation and training.

a. An annual orientation and training for ALL Policy Council members shall be provided within 30 (thirty) days after elections or and thereafter as needed. Training must be completed attended prior to the following Policy Council Meeting. If the training is not attended completed the member will be removed: and a vacancy will be available at the next RPC meeting. Only those Parent Representatives and Community Representatives who complete the training shall be seated.

SECTION 4. Vacancy

When a Parent Representative position is vacated, the affected Regional Parent Committee will elect a new representative.

SECTION 5. Resignation

A member must give the Program Governance Coordinator a written or verbal statement of resignation.

SECTION 6. Termination/Absence

Membership may be terminated because of three (3) consecutive absences between Policy Council and/or subcommittee meetings throughout the year for any reason, except absences for attending a Community Action Partnership of Kern function, or EXTREME weather conditions. Policy Council Members will assume responsibilities until approval of termination is made by the Council.

Termination Appeal Process

- **1.** Submit a written letter of appeal to the Program Governance Coordinator within ten (10) working days of receiving the notification of termination.
- **2.** The Program Governance Coordinator will place the appeal on the following Policy Council agenda for full Policy Council vote.
- **3.** The Policy Council's recommendation will be in effect for the remainder of the current Policy Council vearterm.
- **4.** If an appeal is approved, the termination/absence record will recommence.

SECTION 7. Term of Membership

Head Start Policy Council Representatives are limited to a combined total of five (5) one (1) year terms. All rParent Representatives must stand for election annually. If Once a parent has served a total of three (3) years terms and their child is no longer enrolled in the program they may seek reelection as a Past Parent Community Representative for an additional two (2) years terms. Any member holding membership for four (4) months or more on the Policy Council will be considered to have served one (1) full yearterm.

SECTION 8. Conduct and Conflict of Interest

Any member of the Policy Council who fails to act in the best interest of the Policy Council, or the agency, may be removed by a two-thirds (2/3) vote of the membership in attendance, provided the member has been notified of the proposed action.

No person who serves on Policy Council may be employed by CAPK nor may they have a financial conflict of interest with the agency. The responsibilities of the council and its committees shall be independent of the staff. Individuals serving on the Policy Council may apply for employment with the agency at any time. Any Policy Council representative who accepts employment with CAPK must resign from the Policy Council immediately.

No person shall be employed with Community Action Partnership of Kern while a member of his/her family or a roommate serves on the Policy Council or any non-staff committee or delegate division of the agency. A member of the immediate family shall include any of the following: spouse, parent, step-parent, child, step-child, sister, step-sister, brother, step-brother, father-in-law, mother-in-law, brother-in-law, sister-in-law, daughter-in-law, son-in-law, grandparent, and/or domestic partner.

ARTICLE IV OFFICERS

SECTION 1. Officers of the Policy Council

- **a.** The Policy Council shall will elect a Chairperson, Vice-Chairperson, Secretary, Treasurer, and Parliamentarian.
- **b.** These officers shall perform the duties prescribed by in these bylaws.
- **c.** Currently enrolled parents may hold any officer position.
- **d.** Officers will be elected by a majority vote at the first Policy Council meeting of the new school yearterm and shall serve from election until the seating of new officers the following term.
- **e.** If a standing officer is elected to another executive position, that person will be automatically terminated from his/her former position.
- f.e. No member shall hold more than one office at a time.
- g.f. If the Vice-Chairperson, Secretary, Treasurer or Parliamentarian resigns or is removed from his/her office, an election will be held at the next Policy Council meeting after the official resignation announcement or removal process is voted upon. The Policy Council Chairperson must appoint a Policy Council member to fill a vacant office on an interim basis. until At the next Policy Council meeting where with a quorum is presentestablished, and an election for that officer position can shall be conducted.
- h.g. If the Chairperson resigns or is removed from his/her office, the Vice-Chairperson will assume the office of Chairperson for the remainder of the term of office.

SECTION 2. Functions

1. Chairperson

- **a.** The Chairperson shall preside over and conduct all meetings of the Policy Council in addition to those of the Executive Committee.
- **b.** May Assist support in the development of the agenda with the Program Governance Coordinator and the Director of Head Start/State Child Development or staff designee no later than ten (10) days prior to the meeting.
- c. The Chairperson will meet with the Program Governance Coordinator to review the agenda, no later than three (3) days prior to the meeting date.
- c.d. Refrain from entering debates during the Policy Council meeting.
- d.e. Call the meeting to order on time, follow the agenda and have the ability to clarify the business at hand at all times.
- e.f. Will explain each motion as needed.
- f.g. May vote to break ties.
- g.h. May acknowledge and approve urgent matters acting on behalf of the Policy Council.
- h.i. Appoint members to standing committees and special committees, as necessary.
- **Li.** Appoint members to temporarily assume duties of absent officers.
- **j-k.** In the event of resignation or termination of any Policy Council officer, the Chairperson may appoint a Policy Council representative to fill the vacancy on an interim basis until the next regular Policy Council meeting (see Article IV, Section I).

2. Vice-Chairperson

- **a.** The Vice-Chairperson will chair the Planning Committee.
- **b.** The Vice-Chairperson Sshall act in the absence of the Chairperson or whenever at any time the Chairperson temporarily vacates/steps down from their position.
- c. Perform other duties as may be assigned to him/her by the Chairperson.

3. Secretary

- a. The Secretary will chair the School Readiness Committee.
- b. Call roll and maintain a record of members' attendance at Policy Council meetings.
- c. Keep a record of all Policy Council minutes.
- d.c. In collaboration with staff, Policy Council recorder may be asked to assist with the final documentation of minutes and motions, if needed.
- e.d. Ensure that Policy Council members sign in when attending meetings.
- f.e. Perform other duties as may be assigned to him/her by the Chairperson.

4. Treasurer

- a. The Treasurer will chair the Budget & Finance Committee.
- b. Ensure a monthly Parent Activity Fund report is distributed to the Policy Council.
- **c.** Perform other duties as may be assigned to him/her by the Chairperson.

5. Parliamentarian

- **a.** The Parliamentarian will chair the Bylaws Committee.
- **b.** Shall be able to define the Policy Council <u>bylawsBylaws</u> and advise the Council on such, as necessary.
- **c.** Shall be aware of the <u>meeting</u> format desired by the Chairperson at meetings and assist in keeping within that format.
- **d.** Assist in preserving order during Policy Council meetings. and as may be directed by the Chairperson.
- **e.** Perform other duties as may be assigned to him/her by the Chairperson.

SECTION 3. Training of Officers Officer Training

Training will be provided by the appropriate agency staff or consultants within one (1) month of an officer's election. Training will include the functions, duties, and responsibilities of the officers, and training may also include how to make a motion, the Ralph M. Brown Act, and Robert's Rules of Order as Newly Revised, etc. Follow-up training will be provided by agency staff or consultants as needed.

ARTICLE V

PARENT REPRESENTATIVES TO THE HEAD START CALIFORNIA PARENT CONFERENCE AND NATIONAL HEAD START ASSOCIATION CONFERENCE

- **a.** Pending the annual budget, elections may take place to attend <u>the</u> Head Start California Parent Conference or <u>the</u> National Head Start Parent Conference for members who have not previously attended a training. Alternates may be selected.
- **b.** If a 2nd or 3rd year_term Policy Council Member previously attended a conference and an opening is available, they may be considered to attend.
- **c.** Each member will be required to provide a verbal report of their experience to the Policy Council.

ARTICLE VI POLICY COUNCIL MEETINGS

SECTION 1. Meetings

Regular Policy Council meetings will be held monthly as determined by the Policy Council. Standing committee meetings will be held based on the committee's vote. There are will be no Policy Council or standing committee meetings scheduled during the month of July: aAny matters will be heard at Executive Committee meetings, as necessary.

- **a.** All meetings may be conducted, but are not required, to follow the Ralph M. Brown Act or Robert's Rules of Order, newly revised.
- **b.** Notices of each regular meeting shall be sent to all Policy Council members at least five (5) working days in advance, with including a copy of the agenda for the meeting and the minutes from the previous Policy Council meeting.

- **c.** Meetings may be conducted using a web-based and/or teleconference communication system when deemed necessary.
- d. If meeting using a web-based or teleconference communication system, all members shall have their cameras on and be visible during the meeting.
- e. If a Policy Council meeting is to be held via teleconference the conference call number and sign-in code must be provided to all members and made public.
- f. All Policy Council meetings are open to the public.
- **g.** The Program Governance Coordinator and Director of Head Start/State Child Development or designee will develop the agenda.

SECTION 2. Special Call Meetings

- a. A special call meeting may be called by the Chairperson or the Director of Head Start/State Child Development. A qQuorum will be established at fifty percent (50%) plus one (1) of the Policy Council Executive BeardCommittee.
- a.
- e.b. Policy Council members must be notified by staff at least twenty-four (24) hours prior to a special call meeting by staff, with an explanation of the reasons for calling the special call meeting.
- **d.** Meetings may be conducted using a web based and/or teleconference communication system when deemed necessary.
- e. If a Policy Council meeting is to be held via teleconference the conference call number and sign in code must be provided to all members and made public.
- f. All Policy Council meetings are open to the public.
- g. The Chairperson, Program Governance Coordinator and Director of Head Start/State Child Development will meet to develop the agenda.

SECTION <u>3</u>2. Quorum

- **a.** A <u>Policy Council</u> quorum for <u>the</u> conducting <u>of</u> business will consist of fifty percent (50%) plus one (1) of the <u>Policy</u> Council's membership.
- **b.** The Policy Council may not act on any itemsmatter unless a quorum is present.

ARTICLE VII VOTING RIGHTS

SECTION 1. Vote

- a. The Policy Council will vote by a show of hands or stating "aye."
- **b.** A Policy Council member may vote only if present at a meeting during which a vote is taken and may not vote by proxy or absentee ballot.
- c. A Policy Council member who is out of the room or leaves the room during the time an action item is being discussed may not return to the room and vote.
- **c.d.** A majority vote is required to approve an issue/recommendation.
- d.e. The Chairperson may vote only to break a tie.
- e.f. The Executive Committee may act and vote on behalf of the Policy Council between official Policy Council meetings if a quorum of Policy Council members cannot be met. Every effort will be made via mail and phone to remind Policy Council members of meetings.
- **f.g.** The Chairperson, acting on behalf of the Policy Council, may acknowledge and approve urgent matters.
- g.h. Members joining the Policy Council meeting on a web-based or teleconference communication system will vote by a show of hands or by a verbal response to include the members' name.

ARTICLE VIII STANDING COMMITTEES

SECTION 1. Standing Committees

- a. Each Policy Council member must participate on one (1) standing committee. Policy Council members may sit_one participate on a maximum of two (2) standing committees during the Policy Council yearterm. Standing committees shall develop written recommendations and which will be reflected in the committee meeting minutes and placed on the next Policy Council agenda. The mMinutes shall be available upon request except for meetings involving discussions of agency employees or potential employees, which are deemed confidential.
 - Head Start Representative for CAPK Board of Directors One (1) member
 - Budget and Finance-Seven (7) members
 - Planning –Seven (7) members

- Bylaws <u>Seven Six (76)</u> members
 School Readiness <u>Five Six (56)</u> members

- **c.** In the event a standing committee is unable to carry out its assigned functions in a timely manner (i.e. inability to maintain membership, inability to obtain meeting quorum, etc.), the Policy Council will be responsible for all functions described in Article II.

SECTION 2. Quorum

- **a.** A <u>standing committee</u> quorum <u>of a standing committee</u> shall consist of fifty percent (50%) plus one (1) of the membership of the committee.
- **b.** A standing committee may not conduct business unless a quorum is present.

SECTION 3. Voting

- **a.** A committee member may only vote when present at a meeting during which a vote is taken and may not vote by proxy or absentee ballot.
- **b.** A majority vote is required to approve an issue/recommendation.
- **c.** A committee chairperson may vote only to break a tie.

SECTION 4. Function of the Board of Directors Representative

Policy Council members will be given the opportunity to nominate and vote for a representative of the Policy Council to be seated on the Board of Directors.

- **a.** The elected Policy Council member will need to must be available to attend all monthly Board of Director's meetings and as well as all assigned subcommittee meetings to represent the Head Start program.
- **b.** The elected member will meet with the Program Governance Coordinator within five three (53) days prior to the board meeting to review and prepare for a verbal report provided to the board.
- **c.** In the <u>eventerent that</u> the current member is unable to fulfill duties as a Board <u>Representative, Representative;</u> the position will re-open for <u>the</u> election of a new representative at the following Policy Council meeting.

SECTION 5. Function of the Budget and Finance Committee

The Treasurer will chair the Budget and Finance Committee. The Budget and Finance Committee will perform the following functions:

Work with the Governing Board and agency staff in developing and reviewing the following for recommendation to the Policy Council for approval/disapproval:

- 1. 1301.3 (c)(1) in reference to section 642(2)(D)(iii) as specified in the Head Start Act. Applications for funding and amendments to applications for funding for programs under this subchapter, prior to submission of applications described in this clause.
- 2. 1301.3 (c)(1) in reference to section 642(2)(D)(iv) as specified in the Head Start Act. Budget planning for program expenditures, including policies for reimbursement and participation in policy council activities.
- **3.** 1301.3 (e) A program must enable low-income members to participate fully in their policy council or policy committee responsibilities by providing, if necessary, reimbursements for reasonable expenses incurred by the low-income members.

SECTION 6. Function of the School Readiness Committee

The Secretary will chair the School Readiness Committee. The School Readiness Committee will perform the following functions:

Work with agency staff to review current <u>s</u>School <u>r</u>Readiness goals based on <u>the</u> most recent Desired Results Developmental Profile data collected during annual assessment timeframes.

- 1. 1301.3(c)(2) Use ongoing monitoring results, data on school readiness goals, and other information to conduct its responsibilities.

SECTION 7. Planning Committee

The Vice-Chairperson will chair the Planning Committee. The Planning Committee will perform the following functions:

Work with the Assistant Director-Program or designee, agency staff, Policy Council, and the Governing Board to Eensure that Policy Council members are aware of established agency time frames lines and procedures for program planning. and work with agency staff in developing and reviewing the following for recommendation to the Policy Council for approval:-

The following Governance responsibilities are cited from the Head Start Program Performance Standards 1301.3 Policy Council in reference to the Head Start Act, as amended 642(2)(D)(i-iv)(vi)

- 1. <u>1301.3(c)(1) in reference to §642(2)(D)(i)of the Head Start Act.</u> Activities to support the active involvement of parents in supporting program operations, including policies to ensure that the Head Start agency is responsive to community and parent needs.
- 2. <u>1301.3(c)(1) in reference to §642(2)(D)(ii) of the Head Start Act.</u> Program recruitment, selection and enrollment priorities.
- 3. <u>1301.3 in reference to §642(2)(D)(iii) of the Head Start Act.</u> Applications for funding and amendments to applications for funding for programs under this subchapter, prior to submission of applications described in this clause.
- **4.** (iv) Budget planning for program expenditures, including policies for reimbursement and participation in policy council activities.
- **5.4.** (vi) Program personnel policies and decisions regarding the employment of program staff, consistent with paragraph(1)(E)©(iv)(IX), including standards of conduct for program staff, contractors, and volunteers and criteria for the employment and dismissal of program staff.

SECTION 8. Bylaws Committee

The Parliamentarian will chair the Bylaws Committee. The Bylaws Committee will perform the following functions: 1301.3(c)(1) Policy Council is responsible for activities specified at section 642(2)(D)(v)(vii) of the Head Start Act.

- 4. <u>1301.3(c)(1) as referenced in §642(2)(D)(v) of the Head Start Act.</u> Bylaws for the operation of the policy council.
 - 2.1. 1301.3(c)(1) as referenced in §642(2)(D)(vii) of the Head Start Act. Developing procedures for how members of the policy council of the Head Start agency will be elected.
 - **3.2.** Review and recommend changes to the bylaws.
 - **4.3.** Interpret the bylaws when questions arise.
 - **5.4.** Ensure amendments are rewritten into the bylaws on an annual basis.

SECTION 9. Ad Hoc Committees

Ad hoc committees will be formed for a specific case, situation or purpose when deemed necessary. Representatives may volunteer or will be appointed by the Chairperson.

ARTICLE IX REIMBURSEMENT OF EXPENSES

Policy Council members and including Community Representatives shall be entitled to reimbursement for childcare and/or transportation expenses, as outlined in the agency's Program Governance Reimbursement Policy.

ARTICLE X DISCIPLINARY ACTION

SECTION 1. Definition

Disciplinary action is designed to correct and/or abate any inappropriate actions made by Policy Council members. Disciplinary action may result from a concern, problem, complaint, or grievance brought against Policy Council members. Disciplinary action is applicable to all Policy Council members.

SECTION 2. Inappropriate Actions

Inappropriate actions shall include:

- **a.** Violation(s) of the Policy Council Bylaws.
- **b.** Violation of <u>c</u>Center and/or Policy Council chain of command regarding concerns, problems, or complaints.
- **c.** Personal misconduct when representing the Policy Council or Community Action Partnership of Kern.
- d. Falsification of or making material omissions on forms, records, or reports.
- **e.** Actual or threatened physical violence toward another employee, client, child, or parent.
- **f.** Possessing or bringing firearms, weapons, illegal drugs, or chemicals onto agency property, including vehicles.
- **g.** Using, possessing, or being under the influence of alcohol or controlled substances, as defined by law, while conducting Policy Council business or on agency property.
- **h.** Theft, unauthorized use, and possession or removal of Head Start or agency funds, property, records, or other materials or items belonging to another employee or client.
- i. Destroying or damaging Head Start, employee, or client property or records.
- **j.** Violating safety rules or practices or engaging in conduct which that creates a safety or health hazard.
- **k.** Unauthorized disclosure of confidential information about the agency or any of its clients to the news media or the general public. Any disclosure of confidential client information to anyone, including other employees (refer to "Oath of Confidentiality").
- I. Smoking or vaping on agency property, in buildings and/or vehicles.
- m. Engaging in unlawful activity.
- **n.** Directly or indirectly engaging in outside business or financial interests or activities which conflict in any way with the interest of the agency.
- **o.** Sexual harassment or other unlawful harassment of an employee, Policy Council or Governing Board member, parent, or community representative.
- **p.** Inciting conflict or hostilities.
- **q.** Bringing false accusations to the Policy Council or any of its committees.
- **r.** Slanderous or libelous remarks against members of the Policy Council, Board of Directors, parents or agency staff or clients.
- **s.** Failure to respect and promote the unique identity of each child and family and refrain from stereotyping based on gender, race, ethnicity, culture, religion, sexual preference, or disability.

SECTION 3. Disciplinary Action Process

Disciplinary actions may be initiated by submitting a **written statement** to the Director of Head Start/State Child Development, Program Governance Coordinator, and/or the Policy Council Chairperson. The written statement shall identify the inappropriate actions (see Article X, Section 2.) Written statements must be submitted within ten (10) working days following the occurrence. An acknowledgment of receipt shall be made within five (5) working days by the Director of Head Start/State Child Development or designee.

SECTION 4. Recommendations

The Policy Council member in question shall receive a copy of the written allegations concerning his/her actions and shall be given an opportunity to discuss the statement with the Chairperson and the Director of Head Start/State Child Development or designee prior to any action being taken. The Chairperson will respond to the Policy Council in one (1) or more of the following ways:

- **a.** Recommend that the involved parties discuss the issues and work toward a resolution.
- **b.** Provide a written recommendation to the involved parties outlining corrective action to be taken.
- **c.** Recommend termination by the Policy Council.
- **d.** Dismiss the allegation as unfounded or not within the responsibility of the Policy Council.

The Policy Council's final vote will remain in effect for subsequent years.

ARTICLE XI CONCERNS, PROBLEMS, AND COMPLAINTS

SECTION 1. Definition

- **a.** Concerns. Concerns shall be defined as any issue about which there is an interest, uncertainty, or apprehension relevant to the Community Action Partnership of Kern's Head Start/State Child Development Program (see Section 3.)-
- **b.** *Problems*. Problems shall be defined as any issue about which there is a question raised for inquiry, consideration, or solution relevant to the Community Action Partnership of Kern's Head Start/State Child Development Program (see Section 3.)-
- **c.** Complaints. Complaints shall be defined as a formal <u>written</u> allegation against a person or organization relevant to the Community Action Partnership of Kern's Head Start/State Child Development Program.

SECTION 2. Who May Bring Concerns, Problems, and Complaints to the Policy Council?

Any member of the general community and Policy Council members may bring concerns, problems and/or complaints to the Policy Council through appropriate channels. Complaints shall follow an established protocol for communication. Concerns are to be reviewed, investigated as necessary, and recommendations presented to the Policy Council by the Director of Head Start/State Child Development.

SECTION 3. Concerns, Problems, and Complaints

- **a.** Appropriate channels for General Community:
 - 1. Submit in writing and addressed to the Policy Council Chairperson Program Governance Coordinator and/or attend a Policy Council meeting. If a person from the community would like to speak to the Policy Council, they will have five (5) minutes to inform the Council. A person from the community must submit in writing, within ten (10) working days, the concern or complaint they are having with Community Action Partnership of Kern's Head Start/State Child Development Program.
 - 2. The Policy Council Executive Committee will respond within ten (10) working days to the concern or complaint.
 - 3. If the Policy Council Executive Committee cannot resolve the concern or complaint, it will be sent to Head Start Administration for resolution. Head Start Administration for resolution. Board of Directors will-make a final decision on an as needed basis.
- b. Appropriate channels for Policy Council Members Representatives.
 - 1. Submit in writing or talk to speak with the Program Governance Coordinator. If you support is needed help in submitting the concern or problem in writing, assistance can be obtained from the Program Governance Coordinator.
 - 2. The Program Governance Coordinator, <u>and/or Director of Head Start/State Child Development Director, or designee</u> will contact the Policy Council Representative within ten (10) working days.

ARTICLE XII IMPASSE

SECTION 1. Procedure for Resolution of Impasse between the Governing Body and Policy Council

The Policy Council and Community Action Partnership of Kern Board of Directors shall follow the arbitration process outlined in Head Start Performance Standards 1301.6(b)(c).

- 1. (b) If the agency's decision-making process does not result in a resolution and an impasse continues, the governing body and policy council must select a mutually agreeable third-party mediator and participate in a formal process of mediation that leads to a resolution of the dispute.
- **2.** (c) For all programs except American Indian and Alaskan Native programs, if no resolution is reached with a mediator, the governing body and policy council must select a mutually agreeable arbitrator whose decision is final.

ARTICLE XIII PARLIAMENTARY AUTHORITY

The Policy Council has adopted Robert's Rules of Order as parliamentary authority, however, retains the power to deviate from this formal structure when considered necessary by the Policy Council Chairperson, Parliamentarian or Staff Sponsors.

Responsibility

The Program Governance Coordinator will be responsible for implementing this policy and tutoring all staff who require need the knowledge and skills necessary to assist in implementation.

ARTICLE XIV AMENDEMENT TO THE BYLAWS

These bylaws may be amended by sending a copy of the proposed amendments to each Policy Council member at least five (5) working days before the meeting. The Policy Council will conduct a first reading of the proposed amendment. The Policy Council may debate/discuss and revise any amendment. A vote for adoption of the amendments must be approved by fifty percent (50%), plus one (1) of the members present at the Policy Council meeting.
